Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel (which means, God with us). Matthew 1:23 ESV

Our God is with us. I hope those very words refresh your heart and spirit! Part of my story of following Christ is that there was a time in my life when I lived in Ioneliness and fear. Really, I was afraid of being Ionely. I filled that Ioneliness with girlfriends, sports, friendships—anything I could find to occupy my mind and time. Nothing worked, though.

After my girlfriend broke off our relationship, I realized I was living my worst fear: loneliness. In desperation I accepted her invitation to a Bible study on our college campus. The Bible study was focusing on the Old Testament book of Nehemiah. Immediately I could tell these people knew God as if He were real—as if He were their personal friend. They spoke of Scripture as not just something to know, but also to be lovingly obeyed.

That night my life changed. God met me in a way I had never experienced before, and He put me on a journey to discover who He truly is—that He is not simply a God who is out there, but He is near to us (to me, to you). He is so near, in fact, that there is nowhere we can go from His presence! (Check out Psalm 139.)

A couple of months after that Bible study, on a Friday night in my dorm, I surrendered my life to Jesus Christ. I was alone on a Friday night, which before would have been terrible for me. This was different because I understood I was not alone, but God was with me. Our Savior is Immanuel, God with us. He is with you right now!

I had to laugh at God's confirmation, reminding me that we are like family. I will not emotionally or physically settle elsewhere until God calls.

# Jesus, Tying It All Together

### Believing the Best

If there is any fellowship of the Spirit, if any affection and compassion, make my joy complete by being of the same mind, maintaining the same love, united in spirit, intent on one purpose. Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind let each of you regard one another as more important than himself.

Philippians 2:1-4

To follow and obey this scripture is often pretty difficult. What makes it so hard between us Christians? Because we see things in each other! And sometimes those things are not that attractive. We notice character traits that are not particularly Christ-like in our brother or sister. And then what should we do? We don't want to be labeling or judging our brother, but often we do it anyway.

And so Paul instructs us here in Philippians. The first phrases sound like a series of questions, but Paul is really assuming the answer is clear in our hearts. Do we admit that there is fellowship and friendship between any two believers, simply because of the shared Spirit that resides in each of our hearts? And recognizing this "sharing," that we both share a Savior, does this lead to affection for our brother, and even compassion? He then instructs us to maintain a certain kind of love and to not be so selfish in our evaluations of each other. Instead, we ought to always regard our brother as the one who is really more important. We need to train ourselves to always do this, to always think this, in our heart of hearts.

This may be God's fight of faith for you to engage in—and win—this very day. You may be noticing a weakness in your brother, but deep down, where our judgments and opinions are formed, you and I both need to believe and state clearly to ourselves, that our brother is *good*.

From our conference Greg Cranston (How many pots and pans did that man scrub?), Randy Baker, and Gary Busse stood out. Ones who drove from the other side of Missouri were among the first to arrive and last to leave. "That the leaders led in Israel, that the people volunteered, bless the Lord!" (Judges 5:2).

### Idolatry and Porn: The Allure of Images

Little children, guard yourselves from idols. 1 John 5:21

Ilistened as my fourth-grade teacher explained the worship of idols in an Asian country, and my preteen brain thought, "What? How stupid!"

But if we think idol worship is senseless and wrong, what about pornography? Like idolatry, porn directs your heart to an image. Both idolatry and porn elicit false love without true relationship. Fantasizing over a statue can bring hope and peace. Fantasizing over a nude image can bring pleasure and satisfaction. Yet though seemingly harmless, they destroy. They poison your "worshiping" heart by robbing you of true love—with your Creator or with a real spouse. If you think your spouse (or future spouse) shouldn't be bothered by porn, then how about saying God shouldn't be bothered by idolatry?

A lover's broken heart is on the other side of both fantasies. Spouse. God. You stab the rightful lover when you redirect your heart to a fantasized "other" (and remember, the fantasies actually represent real beings behind the scenes—people in porn and demons in idolatry). Many spouses have reacted by separating temporarily or permanently. And God declared eternal separation over idolatry.

Though it seems difficult, both fantasies *can* be overcome. Our ever-loving Father initiated a pathway to reconciliation when Jesus Christ took eternal separation onto Himself to offer us forgiveness. *God's forgiveness prods us into the reality of true love.* 

Whether porn or idolatry, fantasizing occurs in the mind, so it must be counteracted in the mind. Find people—church members, support groups, and counselors—who can help you stop your imaginations. Seek to focus on God's reality. Truth in the context of loving relationships will set you free from the addictive allure of images.

Don't be afraid to share your failures. Your imperfections. Others need to hear it. It can make all the difference.

#### **Submit and Resist**

Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. James 4:7 NIV

The supernatural world is very real. In Mark 5:1-20 we get to witness the power and love of Jesus on full display: He seeks out and completely delivers a man bound by a "legion" of demons. We learn from our Lord how to deal with demons and spiritual forces that would seek to destroy us.

How do we deal with the devil? Should we go on the offensive and enter into a power encounter with the Evil One? No! We are powerless on our own. It is only through Jesus that we can defeat the ancient serpent.

In fact, James tells us exactly what to do when we are attacked.

First, we **submit**. Submitting to God means humbly putting on the full spiritual armor of God (Ephesians 6). One way we do this is by reading and obeying God's Word (the sword of the Spirit). We should also practice faith-filled praise and intercessory prayer when we feel confronted by Satan and his demons.

Next, we **resist**. Resisting the devil means we withstand, strive against, or oppose. We should be alert, knowing Satan seeks to devour us (1 Peter 5:8). We should also not be caught off guard, so that Satan won't outwit us: "For we are not unaware of his schemes" (2 Corinthians 2:11). We only need to call out to Jesus to defend us and rebuke the devil. He is all powerful—not us. I like the quote by Pastor Skip Hietzig (Cavalry Church of Albuquerque): "When the devil knocks on your door through deception, lies, or emotional attack, don't open the door and rebuke him. Ask Jesus to answer the door."

Finally, never forget that as a believer, we have God living inside of us. That makes all the difference. The apostle John tells us, "Greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world" (1 John 4:4 NIV). Amen!

# Breaking Out of a Sexual Prison

You have had enough in the past of the evil things that godless people enjoy—their immorality and lust, their feasting and drunkenness and wild parties, and their terrible worship of idols. 1 Peter 4:3 LB

Today literally millions are enslaved by pornography, immorality, homosexuality and lust. This includes thousands of Christians who also indulge fantasies or various forms of immorality. In an extensive survey, people were asked if in the last year they had watched an X-rated movie, viewed porn on the internet, made a call for telephone sex, or had made sexual advances toward someone they were not married to; 41% said yes. When we allow lust to have control of our minds and bodies, we become imprisoned and controlled by that habit. How can we break out of that prison? The Bible says by grace--that is by God's help and power.

There are three areas that must be invaded: First, there must be a willingness to cut off the source. This is never easy. We will need help, encouragement, and accountability. We will need to be honest and willing to radically change habits and practices. Second, the primary battle will be in our minds. We will need to memorize Scripture promises and instructions daily. We will need to develop whole new habits of prayer and earnestly seek God's grace, help and power. The final area is fellowship and accountability. We will need to be with people who care and will help us win the battle. We will need to be very honest and acknowledge every failure and indulgence. We may need to start over many times and pay the price of saying "no" to our fleshly desires. "Greater is He who is in you than he who is in the world" (1 John 4:4). Praise God.

#### Scrubbed Brains?

Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come. 2 Corinthians 5:17

In the story of the radical, life-transforming nature of his conversion, Christian musician Barry McGuire reported that his friends and relatives were concerned that he was going overboard. They thought that he was being brainwashed by the Christian group that he had joined. His response? "Yea, my brains needed a scrub—dirty, sick, old brains anyway!"

The apostle Paul says a similar thing in Romans 12:2 (NIV): "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will." The word "transform" in the original language is the word "metamorphoo," from which we get the word "metamorphosis." Can there be a more radical picture of change? The creature's life begins as a caterpillar—ugly, slimy, and earthbound—a creature you might squash and think nothing of it. Then it forms a cocoon and mysteriously, almost miraculously, is transformed into a butterflydelicate, free and gloriously beautiful—a creature that holds you in awe with its breathtaking wonder. This is the kind of transformation that God wants to bring about in our lives.

How does such radical transformation come about? Paul says, "By the renewing of your mind." The mind is our cocoon, the place of our transformation. If we can but see things as God sees them—if we can just comprehend the truth about God, the truth about ourselves, the truth about the past and the future—we will be forever changed.

Is there an area of ugliness in your life that you long to see become a place of beauty? Get God's perspective. Renew your mind. Start to think the way God thinks, and you will be forever changed.

# **Dog Pictures**

Then he said to me, "Son of man, have you seen what the elders of the house of Israel are doing in the dark, each in his room of pictures? For they say, 'The Lord does not see us, the Lord has forsaken the land." Ezekiel 8:12 ESV

For My people have committed two evils: They have forsaken Me, the fountain of living waters, to hew for themselves cisterns, broken cisterns that can hold no water. Jeremiah 2:13 ESV

Jeremiah and Ezekiel were prophets writing from Jerusalem and Babylon, respectively, during the years before the exile of the last Jews from Israel. God used these men to diagnose the spiritual blindness and depravity of the Jews before Jerusalem was destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar and his army in 586 BC. These Jews rejected God both in their willful apostasy and their embracing of other gods: "God doesn't see me anyway; I'll choose my own gods." Does this not sound like contemporary America in our obsession with images, "each in his room of pictures"?

A microcosm of this problem occurred on the day our grandson Amos met his new baby brother. During his nap at our house, Amos was invited home to see the baby. When he woke up, I was eager to leave for this exciting event. Amos did not feel that way. As yet, "baby" and "brother" were abstract words in his 22-month-old mind. What Amos wanted to do was to run to the computer upstairs to see if his grandfather would show him more of the wonderful dog photos they had enjoyed together earlier. Returned to the lower level, Amos disappeared into the laundry room to push the washing machine buttons. That was so much fun!

Amos had not the least idea of the person he was to meet and the huge impact Henry Isaac would have on the rest of his life. He was enthralled with pictures and buttons to push. How like the rest of us, I thought!

The Savior is waiting for our attention every day. Are we eager to meet Him?

## Combatting 94:19

On my bed, I remember you; I think of you through the watches of the night. Because you are my help, I sing in the shadow of your wings. Psalm 63:6-7 NIV

What do you think about when you lie down to sleep? If you're like me, I often reflect back on the day, noting the good things as well as the bad. If something is especially upsetting to me and weighing me down, those bad things can produce a swirl of emotions escalating in fear, alertness, and muscle tension that keep sleep from coming! I call it a "94:19"—"When my anxious thoughts multiply within me . . ." (Psalm 94:19).

At time like these, I've tried different things to promote sleep—slow, deep breathing, focusing on relaxing muscles, or hitting the "off button" in my thinking. King David offers another suggestion that I've tried to add to my sleep repertoire: Remember God!

Instead of letting my mind and heart go wild with escalating anxiety, I need to turn my attention upwards. First, first, first, I must remember God! I must remember that He is there—always—in the middle of the quiet night, when no one else seems to care if I am awake or struggling. **He** is aware and cares!

Second, I need to hand those cares and concerns to Him, knowing that He wants to help and that His shoulders are strong enough, His mind wise enough, and His heart loving enough to take care of my burdens. I need to quiet my heart with the knowledge that He is "on it" in ways I never could be.

Third, I sing myself to sleep. I have several songs based on Scripture that I internally sing, reminding myself that "Yes, He cares, I know He cares . . . "

The rest of 94:19 continues, "Thy consolations delight my soul." And that brings rest indeed!

#### One Act Of Kindness

In those days, while Mordecai was sitting at the king's gate, Bigthan and Teresh, two of the king's officials from those who guarded the door, became angry and sought to lay hands on King Ahasuerus. But the plot became known to Mordecai and he told Queen Esther, and Esther informed the king in Mordecai's name. Now when the plot was investigated and found to be so, they were both hanged on a gallows; and it was written in the Book of the Chronicles in the king's presence. Esther 2:21-23

Mordecai was in the right place at the right time to save the king's life. He chose to disregard his fears and the danger of reporting the murderers. If they found out, they likely would have killed him! Mordecai's act of kindness was recorded but unrewarded. Life went on for the Jews who were captives in Persia.

We underestimate the effect of our good deeds on people coming to Christ. We often think that our faithful deeds of kindness go unnoticed or have little effect on people turning to Christ for eternal life. Later in this story we see the sovereignty of God as Mordecai's deed was rediscovered and, as a result, the plot to annihilate all the Jews was thwarted. Nothing is truly coincidental or unnoticed by God.

Recently, a friend of my wife's family told me how I helped him 40 years ago learn how to clean a paintbrush while simultaneously sharing the gospel with him. He later gave his life to Jesus. I was pleasantly surprised! We rejoiced together. God used one act of kindness to open his heart to the gospel.

Don't underestimate the power your one act of kindness can have in the eternal destiny of others. Here are the last words of Esther, "And many among the peoples of the land became Jews, for the dread of the Jews had fallen on them." May God bring many to Jesus through our acts of kindness!

Over the next few days, I'd love to help refocus you and your family's hearts towards Jesus. I encourage you to carve out some time with loved ones to reflect on the most amazing event in history: God coming to us.

Below is a simple, six-day reading plan that you can do every day. Read the verses out loud together. Talk about what they mean. Pray together, thanking God for our Savior's birth.

#### **Your Position**

For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another place and you and your father's house will perish. And who knows whether you have not attained royalty for such a time as this? Esther 4:14

Have you ever pondered why you have the position you have at work, in your community, in your club, at school, or in government? Is there a reason God put you there?

The entire Jewish population in Persia had been sentenced to death because of an evil man named Haman. Thousands of Jews were to be killed because one Jew named Mordecai was not willing to violate his conscience and bow down to Haman, who was second in power only to King Ahasuerus. Mordecai asked queen Esther, his niece, to inform the king about the evil plot Haman had contrived and to tell him that she too was Jewish. Doing so would be at the risk of her life. None could go to the king unless he requested them to come to him. It was a rare occasion for anyone to ask and then be permitted to come. We read Mordecai's response to Esther's hesitancy and fear, "Who knows if you have not attained royalty for such a time as this?" In other words, "Why do you think God allowed you to be the queen? Maybe it was for this exact moment?" It was a kairos moment indeed!

Esther responded to Mordecai, "Go, assemble all the Jews who are found in Susa, and fast for me; do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. I and my maidens also will fast in the same way. And thus I will go in to the king, which is not according to the law; and if I perish, I perish."

What opportunities has God given you to stand for Him because of your position? Then ask God for courage, solicit the prayers of the saints, and speak up!

But will God really dwell on earth with men? The heavens, even the highest heavens, cannot contain you. How much less this temple I have built!

2 Chronicles 6:18 NIV

King Solomon had the glorious privilege of overseeing the construction of a magnificent temple in which to worship God. At its completion, he led the people in consecrating it to the Lord. Leading out in prayer, he humbly realized that "Wow! This is the God of heaven and earth that we are worshipping! Who are we to think that this puny temple could contain such a God as this?" (my paraphrase).

Amazingly, at the end of Solomon's humble prayer, God's fire from heaven fell and consumed the altar sacrifices and "the glory of the Lord filled the temple" (2 Chronicles 9:1). I've enjoyed watching the CBS reality show, *Undercover Boss*. The show is about a high-ranking executive who dons a disguise to infiltrate his or her own business. The incognito executive then works alongside his own employees in order to learn what really is going on in the business. At the end of the show, the executive reveals to the employees, one by one, who he or she really is. Sometimes the executive punishes poor workers but richly rewards good ones. In some shows, executives have given stand-up workers \$100,000, college educations, homes, needed medical help, or delinquent rent payments. Invariably the workers say something like "Oh, my gosh," when they learn who their fellow employee really was.

In some ways Jesus was like the undercover boss. He came to the earth as a man, though He showed through miracles that He was God. Many who stood at the base of the cross that day looked upon Jesus' body nailed on the tree and would have read the sign above His head, "This is the King of the Jews." Some believed, some did not. Philippians 2:10-11 teaches the day will come when, "every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." I used to think bifocals are for old people. Now that I wear them, my view has changed. (Actually, no one knows since I have the lenses that are graduated.) Why bifocals? They bring the long and the short view into focus. Someone said, "How you view your life shapes your life." Peter had his view adjusted with a conversation from the Lord: "Peter...you are seeing things merely from a human point of view, not from God's" (Mark 8:33).

As a young Christian I remember God beginning to change my paradigm on how I viewed life. An older Christian said this passing comment to me that drastically affected "what I want to live for." He said: "Dennis, just make sure you are living for what will last 100 years from today." It didn't take rocket science to figure out what he was getting at. He is the one who also said to me, "Your time on earth is training time for reigning time." This man was full of one-liners, and most of them dealt with my view of life! He was saying that my life on earth is a test, and if I understand this, it will help me have a whole new way of viewing "bad things" that happen to me.

You may be in a test right now. Maybe it's an impossible problem, unanswered prayer, undeserved criticism, or a sense that God isn't present in your life. (That's a tough one!) Just remember: God wants to use this test to help you view life more from God's perspective. Think about how God wants to use it to strengthen your faith, to develop your character, and to make you long more for your home to come.

#### No Middle Side

[Jesus said,] "Whoever is not with me is against me." Luke 11:23a ESV

I missed a flight once. We got there about a minute after the doors shut. In my mind I felt that we should get credit for "almost" or "close." However, airlines don't work that way. In their way of thinking, either we made it, or we didn't. And we didn't. We watched the plane sit for several minutes and then pull away without us.

Jesus doesn't seem to be much for "almost" and "close" either. He groups people into those with him and those against him. The problem we have with this is that most people don't quite feel that way about Jesus. They believe that they are neither for him, nor against him. They think of themselves somewhere in the middle. They like some of what He says, and they don't like some of it. They think of Jesus as a good or moral person, but they don't believe Him to be the Son of God. They want to take some, but not all.

In speaking about Himself, in the time of judgment, Jesus said, "He will separate the people as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will place the sheep at his right hand and the goats at his left" (Matthew 25:32-33 NLT). Again, no middle. No almost. No close.

In a world of sides, it is important to know what side you are on. Which side are you on? His or yours? He wants you on His side and has made it immensely easy for you to be on His side. Don't settle for the middle—because there isn't one. The things that are holding you back are keeping you from life in Him. Let go and follow Him.

No, the Lord's delight is in those who fear him, those who put their hope in his unfailing love. Psalm 147:11 NLT

*Process, power, plans, capital, vision, connections*. These are the types of words we tend to associate with success—especially in business (and sometimes in ministry). A passion of my heart is The Rock Music (TRM). If I'm honest, I often feel like we should be further ahead or more successful than we are. I tend to think we should somehow have more *reach* for the Gospel with our music ministry than it seems that we do. I can get insecure fairly quickly when I see the success of others around me. Perhaps I don't have the right process, power, or plan?

But I take great confidence in this verse. I am comforted when I remember that God delights in the one who knows Him and is hoping in His love. My strength, if there is such a thing, comes only in that I love the Lord and hope in Him. My *success* must be within that scope. If my passion is wrong, His love will show me. If my plan is flawed, His love will correct me. If my power or ability is misplaced, His love will quide me.

I have big dreams and ideas for The Rock Music (along with many failed plans). *But* I have a God who delights in those who know Him. I will rest confidently in this promise. I will press on to know Him more and more.

Do you know Him? Ask Him right now, "Jesus, help me to know You more and hope in Your unfailing love."

He will show you!
