## David and Goliath?

Goliath was intimidating not only in size and skill but also with insults. He reduced the Israelites to weak, puny men with no hope against him. He was large and in charge. His ground rules would undoubtedly give him the victory. He wanted them to fear him. And they did because they thought that he was just taunting them!

But when David hears Goliath's words, he can hardly contain himself! "Who is this uncircumcised heathen taunting the armies of the living God?" David knew the Israelites were God's people, something they had for-gotten. He knew that God trumped Goliath on any turf. So he changed the game plan and ran out to meet him, not "man to man" but in the "name of the LORD of the armies of heaven and the army of the Israelites." He did not attack with sword and spear (the very thing that Goliath was most trained in), but rather with a mere stone and sling shot.

So all Israel took courage and won the battle. Goliath became bird-feed! Now—who is your Goliath?

## Don't Tarnish the Joy

Michal . . . looked out of the window and saw King David dancing and celebrating, and she despised him in her heart. -1 Chronicles 15:29 ESV

This verse comes from the story of King David returning with the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem. It describes how his wife, Michal, exhibited disdain for the king's expressions of joy. We can certainly see this as a moment in the grander story that is the political tapestry of the era of kings in Judah, but we should also consider that this is a common human experiential response: meeting the joy and celebration of another with jealousy.

Anyone who spends time around kids see this at work with regularity when they utter complaints about supposed "unfairness," such as "How come he got to \_\_\_\_\_\_ while I only \_\_\_\_\_\_?!" As adults, we know that this sort of naked jealousy is (at least somewhat) culturally unacceptable, so we instead mask our feeling behind cheap shots, personal criticisms, and passive-aggressive speech. Yet the principle is just the same: "Someone else is rejoicing . . . and I wish it was me!"

Jealousy leads to division, bitterness, selfishness, greed, and whole hosts of rotten fruit. We should "be on the look-out" for jealousy in our responses to others. Fortunately, God gives us a remedy for this kind of attitude, telling us to "rejoice with those who rejoice" (Romans 12:15). This is the exact opposite of the natural human response!

Today, let us look for those around us who are rejoicing (coworkers, parents, siblings, friends, fellow believers) and make efforts to share that joy and not tarnish it with our jealousy.

## Blue Tassels

You shall make yourself tassels on the four corners of the garment with which you cover yourself. – Deuteronomy 22:12 ESV

The Lord said to Moses, "Speak to the people of Israel, and tell them to make tassels on the corners of their garments throughout their generations, and to put a cord of blue on the tassel of each corner. And it shall be a tassel for you to look at and remember all the commandments of the Lord, to do them, not to follow after your own heart and your own eyes, which you are inclined to whore after." – Numbers 15:37-39 ESV

When I came upon the verse above from Deuteronomy, standing by itself, I reacted. "That's crazy, God! Why?" But I followed the thread of cross references to Numbers 15, which gives God's reason: a tassel is to be a visual reminder to obey God! How creative!

However, as I checked out the notes at the bottom of my ESV Study Bible, I discovered something else: "In the ancient world, tassels were worn by nobles and other high-class people. In Israel they are to be worn by everyone as a mark of their status as the chosen people" (p.290). Wow! God is not demanding a weird fashion of His people—instead He is telling them, "You are all holy, all high-class to Me." He is setting them apart from other cultures of the time as His "treasured possession" (Exodus 19:5-6 ESV). Peter repeats this identity in the New Testament: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession" (1 Peter 2:9 ESV).

Knowing that I am God's treasure makes me want to obey Him, not to follow after my own heart. So I have decided to keep the blue tassel that happens to be on my keychain. It brushes my leg while I drive. Just a reminder.

Consciously or unconsciously, we often want to look good in the eyes of our Christian leaders or friends, so we feel like we must be busy, or at least look busy. How can we avoid this trap?

I like what Wayne Jacobsen said in Finding Church: "The urge to 'do something' when we feel insecure is the driving force behind much of our fruitless busyness. We sincerely want to do something for God, but we are frequently motivated by fear or obligation, and believe that being busy is God's will."

When I was a college student I worked for IBM one summer at their plant. I often finished all my work ahead of time and felt compelled to excessively clean and organize just to look busy for my boss. Another busy person was Martha. She and her sister invited the Lord into their home. Martha was busy getting a meal ready for Jesus, but she was critical of her sister—and Jesus! "Lord, do You not care that my sister has left me to do all the serving alone? Then tell her to help me." She was busy, busy serving in her strength and for her recognition.

A friend reminded me recently that Jesus was pleasing to the Father before His public ministry: "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am wellpleased" (Matthew 3:17). Serving God does not make you any more pleasing to the Father! Serving God should flow from our security in Him and His love. What is your motive? Are you doing some-thing to appear spiritual or important in the eyes of man?

I always thank my God for you because of the grace God has given you in Christ Jesus. - 1 Corinthians 1:4 New Century Version

There are those times when we intercede for someone else, and tragedy still strikes. How do you react? How do you respond to someone going through a hard time?

Where was God? you might ask. He is right there with you. In hard times I like to picture myself curled up on God's lap, feeling His love and comfort all around me.

For someone else going through hard times, the best thing is for you to be there for them. Listen and hold their hand, sharing God's love. The important thing is that it's God's love you share. Oswald Chambers talks about being careful that you aren't so loving that you block God.

"Are we playing the spiritual amateur providence in other lives? Are we so noisy in our instruction of others that God cannot get anywhere near them? We have to keep our mouths shut and our spirits alert. God wants to instruct us in regard to His Son, He wants to turn our times of prayer into mounts of transfiguration, and we will not let Him" (My Utmost for His Highest).

"One of our severest lessons comes from the stubborn refusal to see that we must not interfere in other people's lives. It takes a long time to realize the danger of being an amateur providence, that is, interfering with God's order for others. You see a certain person suffering . . You put your hand straight in front of God's permissive will to prevent it" (My Utmost for His Highest).

When you get in the way, God has no room to minister or draw the other to Himself. Bring your friend God's comfort, God's love, God's peace—not your own.

#### Words vs. Heart

## Wrought with God

But he who practices truth [who does what is right] comes out into the Light; so that his works may be plainly shown to be what they are—wrought with God [divinely prompted, done with God's help, in dependence upon Him]. — John 3:21 AMPC

Last spring I went with a team of seven people from our church on a short-term mission trip to Stockholm, Sweden (May 26–June 5). Our team was comprised of some very capable people, and I was convinced the Lord was leading us from the start. Yet the enormity of just seven of us flying halfway across the world to share Jesus in a foreign land was somewhat terrifying. I came to realize the only sensible position for us was to be "wrought with God."

The Stockholm region has over 2.2 million people and routinely offers permanent residency to Syrian refugees (there are over 30,000 refugees there now). Almost eight out of ten Swedes are either "not religious" or "convinced atheists." They also tend to be introverted and keep to themselves. This poses a very interesting conundrum when thousands of people are looking for help in their city.

We believe this also poses a tremendous Gospel opportunity. We partnered with a young woman and her church who love Jesus and want to make Him known.

When I was looking for encouragement from God's Word to share with the team, I came across the phrase "wrought with God." Read it above in the Classic Amplified translation. After doing more study on this verse, I really began to appreciate the description provided for what "wrought with God" means. It's this simple — God will help us, and the only sensible thing we can do is walk in faith and be completely dependent upon Him.

But in John 21, it appears that Jesus purposely kept the disciples from catching anything so that He could dramatically show them how well He could provide for them.

I have a friend, let's call him Stan, who started a business partnership years ago. So many problems came up that he had to end the partnership and begin a new one. But the same thing happened, forcing him to start over again. On the third partnership, his partner's misuse of funds brought the company into a debt of almost half a million dollars. People were telling him to declare bankruptcy, but he was convinced that God wanted him to pay back all debts.

If you talk to Stan now, you'll meet an enthusiastic evangelist! God has turned the business around, and now Stan makes it a priority to take time off each week to talk with people about how they can have life with Jesus Christ. What has changed Stan's life? Years of darkness—years when he felt he just couldn't win no matter how hard he worked—taught him deep lessons of humility. Is he bitter about all those years of tortured feelings and fears? No, he thanks God for them. He says he knows no better way that God could have taught him such important lessons!

## Does God Toot His Own Horn?

"I am a great King," says the Lord of Hosts. – Malachi 1:14

A time came when God spoke graphically to Israel through His servant Malachi. It was a time when hearts were dull. The people had allowed their hearts to fall in love with the things and toys of this world. God and His truth had become mere form and endless activity. Their awe and sense of devotion had vaporized. They were far from God. Our love for God is always revealed in what we choose to sacrifice and give to God. God reminded them that He was truly a great God and Master, and deserved all their hearts, lives, and possessions.

Prayer is one of the windows of our hearts and reveals the true value we put upon God. It is so easy to give God only the leftovers. God wants to regularly remind us that He is a great King and the only God, and that His name is truly great among all the nations. He is not "tooting His horn," but rather seeking to help us set right our priorities and convictions, so that we may truly know Him and experience His full blessing in our lives.
