Learning our history during Sankofa gave us greater understanding of the history that has shaped our culture and us while reminding us that we have more to discover about each other. It emboldened us to not just share space, but to share our lives as we work in synchronicity together. In 2003, Great Commission Churches hosted the first ever Faithwalkers. As a result of that conference John Hopley's son, David Hopley, came back and started a small group, through which I came to Christ.

THE BIRTH OF A NEW CHURCH

In September of 2016, Walnut Creek Church launched its fifth location in the Greater Des Moines metro area in the town of Altoona, just northeast of Des Moines. This location was started by about 35 adults primarily from Walnut Creek Downtown. In May 2016, the launch team began meeting weekly to share meals, pray, and study God's Word. Over the course of the summer, the team organized many outreach and evangelism efforts in the city of Altoona leading up to the Sunday morning service launch on September 11, 2016.

At Walnut Creek, our mission is to make authentic disciples of Jesus Christ who love and worship God in all they do and to spread the message of the gospel. As we start new locations, that mission drives our prayers and activities. God has been unbelievably faithful

to our church as our team has come together in faith to go to a new part of the city.

God began paving the way for us to go to Altoona long before we launched in September. Altoona is a small community geographically so we knew finding a location to have a service was going to be challenging. In February 2016, we found a church building for sale. Built in 1870 by the Methodist church, it's one of the oldest standing buildings in the city. Other churches had considered buying this building in the past, but were unable to navigate the challenges posed by the modern city code. By God's grace, we were able to get the necessary code variances to use the building as a church once again and purchased it in August.



While we renovate our building in the coming months, we are meeting in Altoona Elementary School. The School district has been a very gracious host to us, and in our first couple months of services we've seen tremendous interest in the community. We had over 100 people at our launch service and have grown every week since then. Our prayer is that God would raise up more laborers so that we can get people connected to the body and walking with Jesus.

SUMMER DISCIPLESHIP PROGRAM

Fifteen years ago, I had the opportunity to participate in an intensive summer ministry project. That summer was a crucial season in my development as a leader and growth as a disciple of Jesus. During that summer, I began to understand and use some of the gifts that God had given me. It was a time of intense, growing devotion to the Lord.

However, for the last few summers in Ohio, we've been missing an experience like this for students. So in May 2016 we launched the Summer Discipleship Program (SDP) at Ohio State University.

SDP is a program designed to help students grow as followers of Jesus Christ. Naturally, one cannot follow Jesus without also taking on some level of

leadership. As Jesus led people so must we who follow His example. This past summer, our goal was to help students know Jesus as followers but also begin to realize their potential as leaders for His kingdom.

Fifteen students lived, learned, and served together this past summer for our pilot version of SDP. Each night we would meet together for dinner as well as teaching, discussion, or ministry. Students learned to watch their doctrine by taking the Scriptures as they mean to be taken. We intensely studied the various genres found in the Old and New Testaments. Students learned valuable leadership skills, spent time diving into deep heart issues, took an intensive course on evangelism and



apologetics, and heard from men and women who have been serving the Lord for decades on a wide range of topics related to the character of a Christ follower. Many of the most profound experiences though came as students shared the gospel on Ohio State's campus and as they took risks for God—practicing what they had learned.

It would be hard to overstate the joy of this past summer in seeing such love and passion for Christ from this group of students. It was a life changing summer. We're already planning and anticipating for God to do great things in the summer of 2017!

GREAT COMMISSION MONTERREY

It's an exciting time for us at Iglesia Gran Comisión Monterrey. We are working to reach out to this busy, thriving city in Mexico and preparing for more church plants soon. Our church in Monterrey began in 2006 and has been reaching out with the Gospel for the last 10 years.

It has been joyful to look back and remember how the church began and how it has now grown to three services. Our members have increased from 40 to 300+. We will finish this year with 21 small groups throughout the city. We strive to be a 'church for those who don't have a church' and refreshing, unique, and Christ-centered in reaching out to a population that has so many strong cultural religious traditions in place.

With a greater number of leaders now prepared and ready to start new churches, we are committed to continued church planting in Monterrey and other important cities throughout Mexico. Church planting is at the heart of "Project 10.5" with the hopes to plant four new churches here in our country over the next five years. With these God-sized goals of more Mexican church plants, and 28 new churches overall throughout Latin America, we are working hard to prepare to send many more workers to the harvest. We are also working hard to secure a new, permanent location for our church services after renting from local hotels over the years. We have had the honor of sending out members to assist in planting other churches and continue to refer members who wish to join and support other growing church plants already in place.



We are excited for our plans to start a new location in the suburb of Cumbres, Monterrey. Cumbres alone has over one million inhabitants with little to no local access to an evangelical church. With this in mind, Gran Comisión already has seven small groups in the area and could begin the new church plant with 100 committed members in place immediately! Our prayer is also that the church could become self-sufficient within the first few months with such a strong foundation in place.

MISSION TO ARMENIA

At the end of May, believers from five different countries gathered in Kiev for a conference about disciple-making. We were challenged to take new steps of faith in being a part of reaching the world for Christ. At the conference, I had opportunity to talk with Tigran and hear about his vision for reaching his homeland of Armenia.

God put it on my heart to take a new step of faith and organize a short-term team to go and help Tigran. Most people thought my idea was unrealistic because most Ukrainians are too poor to take part in such a trip. However, four of us trusted God to provide and in early August we arrived in Masis, Tigran's home city.

Each morning during our trip, we spent a lot of time in prayer and reading John 17

together. We were amazed at how God would speak to us in the morning and then we would have opportunities to put what we read into practice during the day. Specifically, we saw how our unity and joy as a team was a great testimony to the Armenians with whom we had the opportunity to share.

Most of the people that we met are people to whom Tigran and his wife sell milk door-to-door. They do this to provide for their family, but it is also a natural way for them to build friendships. They have begun discovery Bible studies with a number of their customers. We were able to meet with several of their existing groups. We met both new disciples and some unbelievers that are still seeking. It was so exciting to share with these groups the testimonies of how God has worked in our lives.
